Endowment: Yong Chang

My family's story is an American Dream story. It's one common of immigrant families who chose to leave everything and everyone familiar for the chance of a better life and future for their children. In 1969, my father came to the United States from our home in South Korea to find a place where we could make a start. Over the next 5 years as our green cards were approved, we would eventually migrate our extended family of 3 generations to a humble home in rural Kentucky. Our home had 5 acres of land which we farmed by hand to sustain our family until we

could find means of employment. We didn't know the language, the culture, the processes to register for school or apply for jobs. There was real struggle and great uncertainty, but to look

inside our home you would have only seen the determination and commitment to learn by the women of my family and, specifically, by my mother Yong Chang. If you are familiar with east Asian culture you will appreciate her accomplishments as a leader. My mother was in the most disadvantaged position in the home hierarchy, but she became the one who learned English, helped the others (and me) study for our citizenship exams, became a small business owner, and became the social interface for our family to many because she adapted so fluidly.

In this rural community, we were the first minorities they had ever met in person. It wasn't always easy, but there were enough kind people who befriended my mother, embraced my family, and helped us through critical moments that catalyzed what my family has become...what I have become. Decades later, I would graduate magna cum laude with a Bachelors of Science in Chemical Engineering and Mathematics and have contributed to a myriad of innovations in the STEM space and the growth across 9 of Procter & Gamble's billion dollar brands in the global market. I've become a natural leader and executive within an outstanding company, but more importantly I've become a mother, a mentor and coach, and developer of future leaders. Candidly, I live better than I ever thought possible. None of this life would have happened if Yong Chang had not had the courage to step aboard that plane and muscle through life in Vine Grove, Kentucky. Every achievement in my life always blows my mind, and with every one I feel responsible to pay it forward in gratitude for what others and my mother have done for my family and for me.

As I came across Women Walking West, I was called to serve. Our purpose and values are aligned just as they are with Procter & Gamble: we want to improve lives and we recognize the important role and value of women. Many of us have achieved because of the women in our lives, and we have the opportunity to be catalysts for many more. My mother Yong carried me on the plane in 1973 and still carries me in my life to this day. Without her I would not be the leader and person I am. With P&G and my family's support, I am proud to have established this endowment in her honor.

Endowment: Cincinnati Muslim Women

Since 2008, members of Cincinnati Muslim Women have been coming together to support charitable organizations and causes aimed at improving the lives of people in Greater Cincinnati. From medical research initiatives to food banks to women's shelters, CMW has given over \$186,000 in 14 years to 100+ local, non-denominational causes.

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Founding members Shabana Shakir Ahmed, Sufia Sultan, and Zakia Hyder Hasan believe this collective giving not only helps meet authentic community needs, but also allows Cincinnati's Muslim women to connect with their city and the surrounding region in meaningful ways. By empowering others, CMW's 80+ members empower each other. There may be many elements to this group's makeup, yet the identity is one: "We are Muslim. Women. Professional. Compassionate. Cincinnatian."

This "oneness" that has emerged from CMW's drive to empower women and express compassion toward others forms a natural synergy between the goals of the giving group and those of Women Walking West, according to CMW cofounder Ahmed. By establishing the Cincinnati Muslim Women Endowment, CMW expresses its support of W3's mission to provide women with the social, cultural, financial, linguistic, and academic resources needed to succeed in school and professional life.

"We seek to establish dynamic connections with our city, reach diverse causes, and continually give back," says cofounder Sultan. "Partnering with W3 through our endowment fund is one way our members will reach a larger group of women beyond ourselves to make a difference that will matter to women and to Cincinnati."


Classes are small so that students can get the attention they need. The tuition at Cincinnati State is among the most affordable in the region, especially when you consider the high quality of the college's faculty and programs. Credits earned in many courses are transferable to any public college or university in Ohio.

The admissions office helps students with questions about programs and enrollment. Financial aid and scholarships are available. Cincinnati State also assists students with academic and career advising, and transfer opportunities to more than 20 universities.

As a commuter college, Cincinnati State makes efforts to help students meet others with similar interests. The college offers many student organizations and clubs. This can be especially beneficial for students new to the area, and a good opportunity to make friends. Examples include:

- The Cincinnati State Women's Network, which is committed to promoting women of multiple ethnicities through academic support and achievement, community service, self-awareness, mentoring, leadership, and social development.
- The International Students Association, which provides international students support and a chance to interact with other international students and American students through meetings and gatherings.
- The Society of Women Engineers' mission is to create networking and support opportunities for women in nontraditional technical fields and engage in outreach activities to encourage women to consider technology careers.


